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Exercises on Numerical Simulation of Block Structure Dynamics (2D Model)

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WRITTEN EXERCISES

I. BLOCK STRUCTURE GEOMETRY

A layer with a depth (thickness) *H* between two horizontal planes is considered. A block structure is a part of this layer limited and divided into blocks by planes intersecting the layer. Parts of these planes which are inside the block structure or adjoin to it are called "faults". Lines of intersection of faults with the upper plane are also called "faults".

Three or more faults cannot have a common point on the upper plane. A common point of two faults is called "vertex". There are three types of vertices:

- C (corner vertex) a vertex which is an end point of a fault and at the same time an initial point of another one;
- \mathbf{E} (end vertex) a vertex which is an initial (or end) point of a fault and belongs to another one but is not its initial (or end) point;
- I (intersection) a point of intersection of two faults which is not an initial (or end) for each of them.

The structure is separated by the faults into blocks. A common part of any block with the upper plane is a polygon.

For the structure, "boundary blocks" are defined. A boundary block is a continuous part of the structure boundary between two vertices. It is defined by indication of its initial and end vertices.

A fault segment is a part of a fault plane limited by the upper and lower planes and by lines connecting positions on the upper and lower planes of two consecutive vertices of the fault.

EXERCISE 1: An example of fault lines on the Earth surface is presented in Figure 1.

Indicate corner vertices, end vertices, and intersections for the structure in Figure 1.



EXERCISE 2: Find co-ordinates of the corner vertices in Figure 1. Use the point with the geographic co-ordinates 60° N and 40° E as the co-ordinate origin, the east-directed parallel as the axis *X*, and the north-directed meridian as the axis *Y*. Let us remind you that 1° of the Earth meridian is equal to 40000km/360 ≈ 111 km by definition. Use as the length of 1° of the Earth parallel its length for the 60° parallel. Present the co-ordinates obtained in the units of 10 km.

EXERCISE 3: List the faults for the structure in Figure 1. Indicate for each fault the vertices belonging to it. Indicate also for end vertices and intersections another fault to which these vertices belong too.

EXERCISE 4: Find the co-ordinates and relative positions of the end vertices in the faults (the relative position is the ratio of the distance between an initial point of a fault and a vertex to the fault length) for which these vertices are not initial (or end) points.

EXERCISE 5: List the blocks for the structure in Figure 1. Indicate for each block its vertices.

EXERCISE 6: List the boundary blocks for the structure in Figure 1 by following the condition that there is one-to-one correspondence between the boundary blocks and inner blocks being contiguous with the boundaries. Let boundary block 1 be contiguous with inner block 1, and let the boundary blocks be listed in the anticlockwise direction.

EXERCISE 7: List the fault segments for the structure in Figure 1. Indicate for each fault segment the fault to which it belongs, the vertices bounding it, and the blocks being contiguous with it.

II. MOVEMENT OF BOUNDARY BLOCKS AND UNDERLYING MEDIUM

A boundary block is supposed to move progressively in the horizontal plane with a constant velocity and to rotate around the co-ordinate origin with a constant angle velocity. Values of the velocity components V_x , V_y , and the angle velocity U can be different for different boundary blocks.

The medium underlying a block is supposed to move progressively in the horizontal plane with a constant velocity and to rotate around the geometrical center of the block bottom with a constant angle velocity. Values of the velocity components V_x , V_y , and the angle velocity U can be different for different blocks.

The displacements being due to these movements are supposed to be infinitely small relative to the geometrical sizes of the blocks and are defined by the formulas

$$x = V_x t - Y U t$$
, $y = V_y t + X U t$

for boundary blocks or by the formulas

$$x = V_x t - (Y - Y_c)Ut, \ y = V_y t + (X - X_c)Ut$$

for the underlying medium. Here X and Y are the co-ordinates of the point, x and y are its displacements with respect to its position at the moment t = 0, X_c and Y_c are the co-ordinates of the geometrical center of the block bottom.

EXERCISE 8: The point of the boundary block with the co-ordinates (in the units of 10 km): X = 10, Y = 1 had the displacement (in cm): x = -1, y = 0.5 during one unit of the time. The point with the co-ordinates: X = 15, Y = 2 of the same boundary block had during the same time the displacement with the ratio of the components y/x = -1. Find for this boundary block the values of V_x , V_y , (in cm), and U (in 10⁻⁶ of a radian) which correspond to these displacements.

EXERCISE 9: During one unit of time the medium underlying the block shaded in Figure 1 had the following displacements: x = 0.2, y = 0.5 for the point with the co-ordinates X = 2, Y = 1 and x = -0.2 for the point with the co-ordinates X = 3, Y = 3. Let the angles of dip for all fault planes bounding the block be equal (the angles are measured on the block side). Find for the medium underlying the block the values of V_x , V_y , and U which correspond to these displacements.

III. SPACE DISCRETIZATION

Space discretization is defined by the parameter ε . Discretization is made for the surfaces of the fault segments and the block bottoms.

Discretization of a fault segment is performed as follows. Note that any fault segment is a trapezium. Let a and b be the bases of the trapezium. The trapezium height h is given by the formula $h = H/\sin\alpha$, where H is the depth of the layer, α is the dip angle of the fault plane. Let $n_1 =$ ENTIRE (h/ε) + 1, n_2 = ENTIRE $(\max(a,b)/\varepsilon)$ + 1. The trapezium is divided into n_1n_2 small trapeziums by two groups of lines inside it: n_1 -1 lines parallel to the trapezium bases with the distance between them equals to h/n_1 and n_2 -1 lines connecting the points spaced at intervals placed of a/n_2 and b/n_2 respectively on the bases. The small trapeziums obtained will be called cells. The co-ordinates X, Y of the center of the mean line of the cell are assigned to all its points. The block bottom is a polygon. Before discretization it is divided into trapeziums (triangles) by lines passing through its vertices and parallel to the Y axis. The discretization of these trapeziums (triangles) is performed in the same way as in the case of fault segments. The small trapeziums (triangles) are also called cells. For all points of the cell the co-ordinates X, Y are supposed to be the same.

EXERCISE 10: Two blocks are shown in Figure 2. The block bottoms are contoured dashed lines.

Let $\varepsilon = 5$ km. Make space discretization of the fault segment which is common for the both blocks in Figure 2 (the dip angle of the fault segment plane is equal to 60°). How many cells are obtained?

EXERCISE 11: Make discretization of the bottoms of the both blocks in Figure 2 with $\varepsilon = 5$ km. How many cells are obtained for each of them?



IV. ELASTIC FORCES

The elastic force which is due to the relative displacement of the block and the underlying medium at some point of the block bottom is supposed to be proportional to the difference between the total relative displacement vector and the vector of slippage (inelastic displacement) at this point.

The elastic force per unit area $\mathbf{f}^{u} = (f_{x}^{u}, f_{y}^{u})$ at the point with coordinates X, Y at some moment t is defined by the formulas

$$f_x^{\ u} = K_u (x - x_u - (Y - Y_c)(\varphi - \varphi_u) - x_a),$$

$$f_y^{\ u} = K_u (y - y_u + (X - X_c)(\varphi - \varphi_u) - y_a).$$
(1)

Here X_c , Y_c are co-ordinates of the geometrical center of the block bottom; (x_u, y_u) and φ_u are the shear vector and the angle of rotation (around the geometrical center of the block bottom) of the underlying medium at the moment *t*; (x, y) and φ are the translation vector of the block and the angle of its rotation around the geometrical center of the bottom at the moment *t*; (x_a, y_a) is the inelastic displacement vector at the point at the moment *t*. The evolution of inelastic displacements at the point is described by the equations

$$\frac{dx_a}{dt} = W_u f_x^{\ u}, \quad \frac{dy_a}{dt} = W_u f_y^{\ u} . \tag{2}$$

The values of the coefficients K_u and W_u in formulas (1) and equations (2) can be different for different blocks.

At the moment *t* at some point of the fault plane separating the blocks numbered *i* and *j* (the block numbered *i* is on the left and the block numbered *j* is on the right of the fault) the components Δx , Δy of the relative displacement of the blocks are defined by the formulas

$$\Delta x = x_i - x_j - (Y - Y_c^{\ i})\varphi_i + (Y - Y_c^{\ j})\varphi_j,$$

$$\Delta y = y_i - y_j + (X - X_c^{\ i})\varphi_i + (X - X_c^{\ j})\varphi_j.$$
(3)

Here X_c^{i} , Y_c^{i} , X_c^{j} , Y_c^{j} are the co-ordinates of the geometrical centers of the block bottoms; (x_i, y_i) , (x_j, y_j) are the translation vectors of the blocks at

the moment *t*; φ_i , φ_j are the angles of the block rotations around the geometrical centers of their bottoms at the moment *t*.

Accordingly to the assumption that in 2D model the relative displacements of blocks take place only along fault planes, the displacements along the fault plane are connected with the horizontal relative displacement by the formulas

$$\Delta_t = e_x \Delta x + e_y \Delta y, \quad \Delta_l = \frac{e_x \Delta y - e_y \Delta x}{\cos \alpha}.$$
 (4)

Here Δ_t , Δ_l are the displacements along the fault plane parallel (Δ_t) and normal (Δ_l) to the fault line on the upper plane; (e_x , e_y) is the unit vector having direction of the fault line on the upper plane; α is the dip angle of the fault plane.

The elastic force per unit area $\mathbf{f} = (f_t, f_l)$ along the fault plane is defined by the formulas

$$f_t = K_f (\Delta_t - \delta_t), \quad f_l = K_f (\Delta_l - \delta_l). \tag{5}$$

Here δ_t , δ_l are the inelastic displacements at the point at the moment *t* along the fault plane parallel (δ_t) and normal (δ_l) to the fault line on the upper plane.

The evolution of the inelastic displacements at the point is described by the equations

$$\frac{d\delta_t}{dt} = W_f f_t, \quad \frac{d\delta_l}{dt} = W_f f_l. \tag{6}$$

The values of the coefficients K_f and W_f in formulas (5) and equations (6) can be different for different faults.

The reaction force per unit area which is normal to the fault plane is equal to

$$p_0 = f_l \, tg \, \alpha. \tag{7}$$

The horizontal components of the vector (f_x, f_y) of the elastic force per unit area at the point are defined by the formulas

$$f_x = e_x f_t - \frac{e_y f_l}{\cos \alpha}, \quad f_y = e_y f_t - \frac{e_x f_l}{\cos \alpha} , \tag{8}$$

where f_t and f_l are defined by formulas (5).

The formulas given above are also valid for the boundary faults. In this case one of the blocks separated by the fault is the boundary block. The movement of these blocks is described by their translation vectors and rotations around the co-ordinate origin. For the boundary block, the co-ordinates of the geometrical center of the block bottom in formulas (3) are equal to zeros. For example, if the block with the number *j* is the boundary block then in formulas (3) $X_c^j = Y_c^j = 0$.

Note that after space discretization the cells are considered instead of points. The inelastic displacements x_a and y_a or δ_t and δ_t are supposed to be the same for all points of the same cell.

EXERCISE 12: The discretization of the bottom of the left block in Figure 2 was made in Exercise 11. Consider the central cell of the left column and calculate the components f_x^u and f_y^u of the elastic force per unit area for this cell by formulas (1). Take t = 2; for the medium underlying the block: the velocity components $V_x = 0.5$ cm, $V_y = -0.75$ cm, and the angle velocity $U = 0.25 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the block: $K_u = 0.1$ bars/cm, x = 1.5 cm, y = -1 cm, and $\varphi = 0.3 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the cell: $x_a = 0.01$ cm and $y_a = 0.02$ cm. Calculate also for this cell the new values of the inelastic displacements x_a and y_a at $t+\Delta t = 2.01$. Use the finite differences instead of the derivatives and $W_u = 0.5$ cm/bars in equations (2).

EXERCISE 13: Using the result of Exercise 10, consider the central cell of the fault segment which is common for the both blocks in Figure 2 (the dip angle of the fault segment plane is equal to 60°). Calculate the components f_t , f_l , f_x , and f_y of the elastic force per unit area and the reaction force per unit area p_0 for this cell by formulas (3)-(5), (7), and (8). Take $K_f = 0.1$ bars/cm; for the right block in Figure 2: $x_1 = 1$ cm, $y_1 = 1$ cm, and $\varphi_1 = -0.2 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the left block in Figure 2: $x_2 = 1.2$ cm, $y_2 = -1$ cm, and $\varphi_2 = 0.5 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the cell: $\delta_t = -0.02$ cm and $\delta_l = -0.01$ cm. Use the approximate value 1.7 for tg60°. Calculate also for this cell the new values of the inelastic displacements δ_t and δ_l in $\Delta t = 0.01$. Use the finite differences instead of the derivatives and $W_f = 0.5$ cm/bars in equations (6).

EXERCISE 14: Make the space discretization of the fault segment being adjacent to the left side of the left block in Figure 2 (the dip angle of the fault segment plane is equal to 60°) with $\varepsilon = 5$ km and consider the central cell. Calculate the components f_t , f_l , f_x , and f_y of the elastic force per unit area and the reaction force per unit area p_0 for this cell by formulas (3)-(5), (7), and (8). Take t = 2; $K_f = 0.1$ bars/cm; for the left block in Figure 2: $x_1 = 1.5$ cm, $y_1 = -1$ cm, and $\varphi_1 = 0.5 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the boundary block being adjacent to the fault segment: the velocity components $V_x = 1$ cm, $V_y = 2$ cm, and the angle velocity $U = -0.2 \cdot 10^{-6}$; for the cell: $\delta_t = 0.01$ cm and $\delta_l = 0.03$ cm. Calculate also for this cell the new values of the inelastic displacements δ_t and δ_l at $t+\Delta t = 2.01$. Use the finite differences instead of the derivatives and $W_f = 0.5$ cm/bars in equations (6).

V. EARTHQUAKE AND CREEP

Denote

$$\kappa = \frac{|\mathbf{f}|}{P - p_0},\tag{9}$$

where $\mathbf{f} = (f_t, f_l)$ is the vector of the elastic force per unit area defined by formulas (5), *P* is the parameter which may be interpreted as the difference between lithostatic and hydrostatic pressure (*P* has the same value for all faults), p_0 is the reaction force per unit area which is defined by formula (7).

For each fault the values of the following three levels are specified:

 $B > H_f \ge H_s.$

Initial conditions for numerical simulation of the block structure dynamics are supposed to satisfy the inequality $\kappa < B$ for all cells of the fault segments. If at some moment t_i the value of κ in any cell of a fault segment reaches the level *B*, a failure ("earthquake") occurs. A failure means a slippage during which the inelastic displacements δ_t , δ_l in the cell changes abruptly to reduce the value of κ to the level H_f .

The new values of the inelastic displacements are calculated by the formulas

$$\delta_t^e = \delta_t + \gamma f_t, \quad \delta_l^e = \delta_l + \gamma f_l, \tag{10}$$

where δ_t , δ_l , f_t , and f_l are the values of inelastic displacements and the components of the vector of the elastic force per unit area just before the failure. The value of the coefficient γ is defined by the formula

$$\gamma = \frac{1}{K_f} - \frac{PH_f}{|\mathbf{f}| + H_f f_l \operatorname{tg} \alpha} \frac{1}{K_f}.$$
(11)

It follows from formulas (5), (7), (9)-(12) that just after the failure the value of κ equals to the value of the level H_f .

The cells in which the failures occurred are considered to be in the creep state. It means that for these cells the parameter W_s ($W_s \ge W_f$) is used instead of the parameter W_f in equations (6) which describe the evolution of the inelastic displacements. The values of the parameter W_s can be different for the different faults. The cell is in the creep state until $\kappa > H_s$ for it. When $\kappa \le H_s$, the cell returns to the ordinary state and for this cell the parameter W_f is used in equations (6) after that.

The parameters of the earthquake are defined by the following way: the time moment is t_i ; the co-ordinates and the depth are the weighted sums of the co-ordinates and the depths of the cells in which failures occurred (the weights of the cells are their squares divided on the sum of squares of those cells); the magnitude is calculated by the formula

$$M = 0.98 \log_{10} S + 3.93, \tag{12}$$

where S is the sum of the squares of the cells (in km^2) in which failures occurred during the earthquake.

EXERCISE 15: Table 1 contains the values of δ_t , δ_l , f_t , and f_l for the cells of the fault segment which is common for the both blocks in Figure 2. These cells were obtained as the result of Exercise 10. Numbering of the rows proceeds from the upper plane to the lower one. The dip angle of the fault segment plane is equal to 60° .

Take P = 2 Kbars and calculate the values of κ for the cells from Table 1. Use formulas (7), (9), and the approximate value 1.7 for tg60°.

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EXERCISE 16: Using the result of Exercise 15, list the numbers of cells (accordingly to Table 1) for which failures occur. Calculate the new values of δ_t and δ_l for these cells by formulas (10), (11). Assuming that failures have occurred only in these cells, calculate the sum of their squares and the co-ordinates, the depth, and the magnitude of the earthquake.

Take B = 0.1, $K_f = 0.1$ bars/cm, $H_f = 0.085$, and the approximate value 1.7 for tg60°.

EXERCISE 17: Using the result of Exercise 15, list the numbers of cells for which the creep state is possible. Take $H_s = 0.07$.







 $\delta_t = 1299 \text{ cm}, \delta_l = 961 \text{ cm} \text{ for cell 5};$

 $\delta_t = 1749$ cm, $\delta_l = 1361$ cm for cell 10.

The sum of the squares of cells 5 and 10 is $0.256 \cdot 10^2 \text{ km}^2$.

The parameters of the earthquake are the following:

co-ordinates $X = 5.6125 \cdot 10$ km, $Y = 3.05 \cdot 10$ km; depth 3.6125 km; M = 5.30.

EXERCISES ON THE COMPUTER TERMINAL WITH PROGRAM EARTH

EXERCISE 1

Task: To specify the block structure given in Figure 1 and to simulate its dynamics. Use the same co-ordinate system X, Y as in Exercise 2 of Section I of the written exercises, specify the lengths of the co-ordinate segments to be equal to 5.55. Compare the printout obtained with the results of Exercises 1-7 of Section I of the written exercises. Input files: file with initial structure $-n_{0}$, file with initial data – no.
